All students in the center on Study Connection days (Wednesday), are required to do homework during the hours between 4:00-5:00 pm, whether they are bussed in from Franke Park School or are regular attendees of the after-school program. On other afternoons, the CYC youth work on homework from 4:30 -5:00 pm.

Computers are only available for homework projects during this time and only after approval from a staff member. The gym is also closed during this time. The emphasis for this one hour is homework and study.

It is interesting that kids who 'didn't have homework' when the gym was open, suddenly find homework to do in order to remain in the center.

It has been encouraging to the staff when they see older youth volunteering to partner with the younger kids to review their spelling and reading.



In Merlin Carothers' book "From Prison to Praise", Carothers always finished each story by sharing the incredible blessings those he counseled received, after

they thanked the Lord in the midst of a tragedy they faced. I was reminded to be patient because everything happens in the Lord's perfect timing.

Shortly after I put my dog to sleep, I began looking for another companion. I knew God would find a new dog for me, though I asked my corps officers if this meant He would just provide a pet for me or would I have to look? Both officers assured me God expects us to do the work and then He will deliver a blessing. My husband lives in Colorado and I called him often to share my grief. He reassured me during each call when I told him how lonely I felt. One week passed and Marc surprised me by showing up at our doorstep, three days before our 27th anniversary. He booked his flight in January and planned to stay for three weeks. His arrival brightened my spirits and I didn't feel so lonesome.

I began searching for a Golden Retriever through computer sites, the newspaper and by word of mouth. Major Lynnetta Poff looked on line and came to work, often excited to show me her new 'finds'. I searched for three weeks and began to doubt whether I would find a retriever or any type of breed. I was turned down for several out of town shelter pets because Sarah had not been spayed. I could not afford to buy a Golden

Retriever puppy, since the average prices I saw were between \$800.00-\$1,000.

I saw a GoldenDoodle (a Golden Retriever/Poodle Mix) on Ft. Wayne Animal Care and Control's website. Major Poff and her daughter offered to come with me to see the dog the next day. We arrived at the shelter before 12:00 pm when they opened. Two others were in line before us to check out the same dog. The door opened and we rushed inside. Immediately the shelter volunteer announced Gracie was on her way to a new home. We all sighed with disappointment. The two other people interested in Gracie went into the kennel area to see the other available dogs. The volunteer said, "We just received a Golden Retriever today for adoption.", as we came up to the counter. He asked if we were interested and Major Poff shouted, "Yes, we want to put a hold on the Golden." I handed my completed application to him and walked into the kennel. This was amazing! Purebred Golden Retrievers are seldom given up by their families for adoption. When they are available, they are adopted right away.

I peeked in where the larger breeds were kept and saw the most beautiful Golden Retriever I have ever seen, wagging her tail. Major Poff knew I'd fallen in love with this five year old, affectionate dog and swiftly walked out to find the shelter volunteer. I held my breath (and was told not to be so nervous) as the dog was brought into a room where we could get to know her. Being a worrier, I was sure the dog didn't like me, as I sat down and rubbed her tummy. Even though the shelter volunteer walked in and said, "I think we've found a match," I still did not relax. As directed, I

called the shelter and left a message at 5:00 pm to verify I still wanted the dog and Amy called me at 8:30 am the next morning for an interview. I was so happy when Amy scheduled a time for me to pick 'Jenna' up from the shelter which was less than a month after putting Sarah to sleep. I was also surprised when Amy told me I would only need to pay \$25.00 for Jenna, a dog that would normally cost \$85.00-\$130.00. Since Jenna was five years old, a grant was available to help with fees to encourage people to adopt older pets.

God blessed me with more than I could have imagined. He provided me with solace during my search, by allowing my husband to come home at the right time. Jenna was scheduled to be picked up the day after Marc was leaving.

Jenna is so incredibly well behaved and was very well trained by her family. The first night she jumped in my bed and snuggled with me until my alarm went off the next morning. Incredibly, she had also been trained to wake her master up when an alarm sounds. Because of this ability alone, anyone I have ever worked for would say, "This is an answer to prayer for me," as I am often late.

It is so very joyful when you recognize how the Lord works in your life and you want to share this joy with everyone. God also knew I needed a boost to wake up in the morning (He must have a sense of humor). I encourage everyone to trust God when He asks us to thank Him in all things. God is forever faithful and will surely bless you, as He did me, when you are obedient to His Word.
