with substances that take away our ability to think and reason. It's not good news to those who want to keep people enslaved by their ideas and philosophies.


But, it is good news to those who need the love and grace and mercy of God, to help them survive today.

One for the record books

How I set out to ring a bell and found unbridled support from my community.

Steve Batzka (above) began his quest for the World Record of Bell Ringing at 1:00 pm on December 11.

It all began on a cold December day in front of the newly remodeled Village of Coventry Kroger Marketplace. I parked my car and began heading into the store. Except this was no ordinary visit to the grocery store, I was going to attempt to set a world record. A record for the worlds longest bell ringing session for The Salvation Army. I had my classic bright red apron and trusted bell in tow. Ready to start a feat that could go down in history.

The current record was 60 continuous hours of bell ringing and it dawned on me what a crazy idea this was.

Ring for more than two straight days? With limited breaks? And standing the whole time? I've been bell ringing since my freshman year in high school, but nothing quite this extreme. But, I didn't hesitate as I set up my mat and laid out my whiteboard.

Then I started ringing, greeting people with my usual holiday cheer as they came and went. It went on like this for most of day one; relatively unnoticed at first just appearing as a normal volunteer bell ringer to the many who entered the store.

For those who stopped and asked what was going on, I explained what I was attempting to do and would generally get one of two responses. "Wow that is crazy, good luck" or "Wow that is amazing, is there anything I can do to help you?" This blew me away. Total strangers moved to take action by what I was doing? I felt humbled by the sheer amount of support people offered. From food to drinks to seasons greetings and words of encouragement. The Fort Wayne

community showed me a side I feel many people don't get to see often enough.

Early the second morning I was visited by a woman who had heard of me on the radio during her commute. She had come out of her way to bring me a coffee and a donation, along with well wishes on my attempt. The day started out quietly with steadily increasing traffic as the morning drew on. The most popular comment I received from people was, "Are you the man I heard about on the news going for the world record?" "Yes, yes I am," I would reply. It was very encouraging to see how generous people were being now that some knowledge of what I was doing had spread.

Then things got busy around noon. News crews came to do stories for the 5 o'clock news on me. The Journal Gazette sent several people out to take pictures and Frank Gray came by do an interview. I was making some good waves to draw attention to this year's Kettle Campaign and it felt great. Later that night once the crowds had gone and the energy level bottomed out, it became increasingly hard to stay upright and ringing. I could hear every ring pound through my head as a migraine set in. As I pushed through the night towards hour 36, I knew it was time to lay down my bell. I came in fourth out of seven ringers attempting to set the world record. The winner of the competition rang 80 hours. Now, that is crazy!

I would again like to thank everyone who helped and supported me, including the managers and staff of the Village of Coventry Kroger Marketplace and the official 'witnesses' who timed my breaks. Without you, I never could have done this. It was an experience like no other and I would gladly do it all over again. While I might not have set a world record, I did give attention to a cause close to my heart this holiday. Not to mention I set a new kettle record for this Kroger store by raising a total of \$1,091.16. Thank you Fort Wayne!
